Dear film fans

May and June at Buxton cinema offers tales of spies, superheroes, sing-a-longs and spooky stories.

Our screenings continue with The Royal Ballet's powerful retelling of *Manon*. This is the story of an impulsive young woman who pays the ultimate price for choosing luxury over love. Based on the novel *Manon Lescaut* by Abbé Prévost, this adaption is choreographed by Kenneth MacMillian and shown as part of the celebration of MacMillian's impact on British Ballet. **If you liked *Bernstein Centenary* this ballet masterpiece is for you.**

Ready Player One is Steven Spielberg's latest science fiction movie, based on the book from Ernest Cline. Set in 2045, many of Earth's cities have degenerated into slums with the only escape provided by the virtual reality world of Oasis. When the creator of Oasis dies a challenge is released for users to have the chance to win his fortune. **If you liked *The Maze Runner* this Sci Fi will be out of this world.**

Our silver screenings offer two classics, *Look Back In Anger* and *The Sound of Music*. *Look Back In Anger* originally released in 1959, stars Richard Burton as a disillusioned and angry university graduate who is struggling to come to terms with his grudge against the middle-class life and values. *The Sound of Music* has imbedded itself into film history and is one of most beloved film classics. This heart-warming story follows a young Austrian woman who questions her life choices when she becomes a governess to the children of a naval officer.

Red Sparrow sees famed Russian ballerina Dominika Egorova (Jennifer Lawrence) forced into a life of deceit and espionage when a career ruining injury leads to her becoming a Russian intelligence operative. Known as a 'sparrow', she is forced to use her body as a weapon to infiltrate the CIA and discover the identity of mysterious mole Marble. **If you enjoyed *Atomic Blonde* this spy thriller is right up your alley.**

One of this year's most popular films has to be *The Greatest Showman*. Not only is this a chance to enjoy this film again, you can join in with the award winning songs, sing have fun and 'Come Alive' It's nearly showtime! **If you like *Moulin Rouge* get yourself tuned up and ready to sing-a-long.**

Spooky Brit flick *Ghost Stories* will have you chilled to the edge of your seat. 'Things are not always what they seem' and the same can be said about this film from the mind of Andy Nyman. Frequent collaborator with Derren Brown, Nyman both directs and stars in this psychological horror. Packed with full on scares, the true terror of this film lies in the smaller things. As they say, the devil is in the details. **If you're brave enough for Derren Brown's *The Push*, then this will test your nerve.**

Another film from the Marvel universe is *Avengers: Infinity War*. The Avengers must now join forces with the Guardians of the Galaxy to stop the powerful Thanos. Having arrived on earth after the events of *Captain America: Civil War*, Thanos is on a mission to bend reality to his will by taking the infinity stones and using them to destroy the universe one planet at a time. **If you liked *Captain America: Civil War* this Marvel masterpiece is a must see.**

The beloved garden gnomes are back! Gnomeo and Juliet are back for a whole new adventure in London. When gnome napping occurs in their very own garden, there is only one gnome to call... Sherlock Gnomes. The famous detective and gnome protector investigates the case leading the gnomes to explore the undiscovered side of the city. **If you loved *Gnomeo and Juliet* this the comic adventure you're looking for.**

See Maxine Peake dominate the screen in this gritty role about a female club comedian trying to break into the male orientated circuit. *Funny Cow* has to battle sexism and develop a back bone rather than a funny bone to conquer the unforgiving environment of 70s Yorkshire club circuit. This complex film may not be a laugh-out-loud comedy despite the name, but it's the stellar performance from Peake which is central to this film's appeal. **If you liked *Tyrannosaur*, this unflinching film is worth seeing.**

Adapted from Ian McEwan's bestselling novel, *On Chesil Beach* follows the courtship of a young couple from dramatically different backgrounds. Whilst they enjoyed an idyllic courtship, a fateful wedding night has the potential to destroy their marriage. Starring Saoirse Ronan and Billy Howle this British drama is the directorial debut of Dominic Cook. **If you liked *Enduring Love*, you'll enjoy this.**

The Royal Ballet: Manon

Ballet in three acts. Kenneth Macmillan's powerful telling of Manon and Des Grieux's tragic love is a masterpiece of modern ballet, set to music by Massenet. Designs Nicholas Georgiadis depict a world of lavish splendour polluted by miserable destitution. The spectacular ensemble create vivid, complex portraits of Paris and New Orleans society. But it is the impassioned pas de deux that drives this tragic story, and make Manon one of MacMillan's most powerful dramas.

Look Back in Anger

College dropout Jimmy plays music at a jazz club and works at a candy stall with partner Cliff, who lives with Jimmy and his wife, Alison. Embittered by his working-class life, Jimmy constantly insults Alison, whose family is upper class. When Alison invites self-assured Helena to stay, Jimmy's grievances threaten to boil over.

The Magic Flute
 (U) 2hrs 15mins

The Queen of the Night enlists handsome prince Tamino to rescue her beautiful kidnapped daughter, Princess Pamina, in this screen adaptation of Mozart's opera. Aided by the lovelorn bird hunter Papageno and a magical flute that holds the power to change the hearts of men, young Tamino embarks on a quest for true love, leading to the evil Sarastro's temple where Pamina is held captive.

NT Live: Macbeth
 (15) 3hrs 30mins

The ruined aftermath of a bloody civil war. Ruthlessly fighting to survive, the Macbeths are propelled towards the crown by forces of elemental darkness. Shakespeare's most intense and terrifying tragedy, directed by Rufus Norris (The Threepenny Opera, London Road), will see Rory Kinnear (Young Marx, Othello) and Anne-Marie Duff (Oil, Suffragette) return to the National Theatre to play Macbeth and Lady Macbeth.

Red Sparrow

Dominika Egorova (Jennifer Lawrence) is drafted against her will to become a sparrow, a trained seductress in the Russian security service. Finding her power in an unfair system, she emerges as one of the program's strongest assets. Her first target is Nate Nash (Joel Edgerton), a CIA officer who handles the agency's most sensitive infiltration of Russian intelligence. The two operatives fall into a spiral of attraction and deception, which threatens their allegiances and the security of both countries.

Despite his family's baffling ban on music, Miguel dreams of being a musician like his idol, Ernesto de la Cruz. Desperate to prove his talent, Miguel finds himself in the stunning and colourful Land of the Dead following a mysterious chain of events. Along the way, he meets charming trickster Hector, and together, they set off on an extraordinary journey to unlock the story behind Miguel's family history.

A thrilling drama about the unlikely partnership between The Washington Post's Katharine Graham, the first female publisher of a major American newspaper, and editor Ben Bradlee, as they race to catch up with The New York Times to expose a massive cover-up of government secrets that spanned three decades and four U.S. Presidents. The two must overcome their differences as they risk their careers - and their very freedom - to help bring long-buried truths to light.

Mildred (the brilliant Frances McDormand) wants justice and she is fed-up waiting for the local police to get results. Police Chief Willoughby (a sensitive Woody Harrelson) struggles to reassure Mildred that he and his officers are doing all that they can. London-Irish playwright Martin McDonagh's script is packed with wit, pathos, anger and surprise.

Hesitant to the extravagance at first, Marlo comes to form a unique bond with the thoughtful, surprising, and sometimes challenging young nanny named Tully (Mackenzie Davis).

The Leisure Seeker is the nickname of the old RV used by Ella (Helen Mirren) and John Spencer (Donald Sutherland) to holiday in the 1970s. On a summer morning, the couple astonish their meddling adult children by hopping on board the dated vehicle for a new adventure. Their trip takes them through an America they no longer recognize mixing hilarious moments with others of pure terror, giving them chance to retrace a married life nourished by devotion.

A Fantastic Woman

Marina (Daniela Vega) is transgender and works as a singer and a waitress in Santiago. Her boyfriend, Orlando, is older than her - has been married before. His family struggles to accept Marina. This ground-breaking film is gripping - thanks in no small part to Vega's performance - and has much to say about the lives and experiences of people still at the sharp end of violence and hostility.

Maxine Peake plays the gritty role of 'Funny Cow', a comedian who breaks through the glass ceiling of the all-male 1970s comedy circuit to rise to stardom. Set against the backdrop of working men's clubs in the North of England, Funny Cow is both a love-letter to a bygone era and the defiant story of a woman who refuses to give up her dreams.

Deadpool 2

(Cert: TBC) 2hrs

After surviving a near fatal bovine attack, a disfigured chef (Wade Wilson) struggles to fulfil his dream of becoming the hottest bartender while also learning to cope with his lost sense of taste. Searching to regain his spice for life, Wade must battle ninjas, the yakuza, and a pack of sexually aggressive canines, as he journeys around the world to discover the importance of family, friendship, and flavour - finding a taste for adventure and earning the coveted coffee mug title of World's Best Lover.

Peter Rabbit

(PG) 1hr 35mins

Peter Rabbit, the mischievous and adventurous hero who has captivated generations of readers, now takes on the starring role of his own irreverent, contemporary comedy with attitude. In the film, Peter's feud with Mr. McGregor escalates to greater heights than ever before as they rival for the affections of the warm-hearted animal lover who lives next door.

The Sound Of Music Restoration

(U) 2hrs 48mins

A tuneful, heartwarming story, it is based on the real life story of the Von Trapp Family singers, one of the world's best-known concert groups in the era immediately preceding World War II. Julie Andrews plays the role of Maria, the tomboyish postulant at an Austrian abbey who becomes a governess in the home of a widowed naval captain with seven children, and brings a new love of life and music into the home.



Mon 11 June

120 Beats Per Minute

(15) 2hrs 23mins

This French drama is set in Paris in the 1990s. The gay community is being devastated emotionally and physically by AIDS and how to cope and react to that is the subject of the film. At one level it is about a collective response, on another it is a personal story about Nathan and Sean who have to confront illness. Amidst the fear and anxiety there are also the joys of dance and sex.

The Royal Ballet: Swan Lake

(15) 3hrs

The Royal Ballet presents a new production of Tchaikovsky's magnificent classical ballet, with additional choreography by Liam Scarlett and designs by John Macfarlane. Prince Siegfried chances upon a flock of swans while out hunting. When one of the swans turns into a beautiful woman, Odette, he is enraptured. But she is under a spell that holds her captive, allowing her to regain her human form only at night.

Entebbe

(12A) 1hr 47mins

Entebbe is based on the 1976 true story of four hijackers who took a plane hostage and forced it to land in Entebbe, Uganda, while they demanded the release of dozens of Palestinian terrorists. The ticking-clock thriller follows the hijackers and hostages as well as the political leaders trying to decide whether to negotiate or send an elite special forces unit on a dramatic rescue mission to free the hostages.

Drawing strength from the fantastical stories she invents, Parvana embarks on an epic quest to find her father and reunite her family.

On Chesil Beach

Summer 1962, and England is still a year away from huge social changes: Beatlemania, the sexual revolution and the Swinging Sixties. On their honeymoon, newly-weds Florence and Edward become tense at the prospect of consummating their marriage. Through flashbacks we learn the differences between their attitudes, temperaments and backgrounds. On Chesil Beach, one of them makes a decision that will change their lives forever.

After the Storm

(15) 1hr 58mins

This prize-winning Japanese family drama combines melancholy and a wistful, gentle humour. Ryota is a gambler and fails to provide financial support for his son; unsurprisingly ex-wife is fed-up with his excuses. Meanwhile Ryota suspects that his sister is trying to take advantage of their elderly mother. A film about how 'you can't always have the life you want, or be who you want to be.' Families, eh?
